



FRANCIS BOUILLON : FROM THE ICE TO THE WATER

Francis Bouillon is a veteran hockey player with fifteen seasons in the National Hockey League under his belt, eleven with the Montreal Canadiens and four with the Nashville Predators. Approaching 40, with two beautiful children, Francis is increasingly aware of the importance of taking a break between his intense seasons on the ice. Fortunately, he's found the perfect activity for relaxing with his family between games, training sessions, and trips away.

When you arrive at the Bouillon family's lakefront cottage, with its zen-inducing views, you quickly understand why Francis goes there to unwind. Tied up at the dock on the lake's tranquil waters are two magnificent Princecraft boats, one for fishing, the other for touring, but both for having a blast!

Francis hasn't always been big on fishing. He considers himself to be a city boy, a real Montrealer despite his seasons in Nashville. "I never went boating when I was little, no one ever passed that passion on to me. In any case, I put so much energy into hockey that I don't think I would have been interested. But when I bought the cottage, I developed a taste for the outdoors. I realized that I loved boating, and I didn't want my children to miss out."

With his Xpedition 200, Francis has found a great activity to share with his sons. In fact, the outdoor life seems to be much more natural for them than for him. Almost every weekend during the summer,

you'll find the Bouillon family on the shores of Lake Saint-François in the Montérégie Region. As soon as they arrive from the city on Friday evening, the refrain is almost always the same: "Dad, can we go fishing this weekend? Please, please, please!" So on Saturday morning, the crew is up and out on the water early, fishing rods in hand.

Although they sometimes use the family pontoon boat, Francis prefers his Xpedition for fishing. "It's much more fun on a real fishing boat. After all, it's designed with fishing in mind. The boat has an electric motor in front so when I see a hard-to-reach spot where fish are likely to lurk, I can go check it out. I'm also really impressed with the boat's storage capacity. Even with several people onboard, everything can be neatly cleared away, so everyone has enough space." The hockey pro speaks from experience: On his former fishing boat, rods were always underfoot, and his children kept tripping on them. With everything safely stored, the three of them can better enjoy the 20 ft. of space because they're not constantly stepping on each other's toes.

"Lake Saint-François is fun for touring, but for fishing it's fantastic, it's probably the only time my kids are quiet. I love it. We often spend the day testing various techniques. I'm learning all the time. Folks are nice, they give us tips, which I appreciate since I'm just a beginner. As a family activity, it's really a keeper. My boys adore fishing."

BEST DRAFT PICKS IN LAKE SAINT-FRANÇOIS

BASS: "We often fish for bass with the kids. Bass are fun because there are lots of them and they make us fight a bit before reeling them in. The boys are sometimes disappointed to have to return them to the water. 'We can't eat those, dad?'"

WALLEYE: "Walleye are my favorite! I've learned about a few walleye spots from friendly anglers at the Port Lewis Marina, for which I act as spokesperson. We've brought a few walleye home, and my boys are happy to be able to eat those."

STURGEON: "We've been fishing here for two or three years and I just found out that there are sturgeon in the lake. We'll try fishing them soon, and I'll let you know what happens next year."

FROM GENERATION TO GENERATION

Fishing just comes naturally to Norman. Back when he was still barely as tall as the family boat, he used to go fishing for walleye with his dad and granddad on Lake Saint-François in the Appalachians. He gradually learned the basics of what would later become his trade. "My dad used to tell me not to talk while fishing so as not to scare the fish, and now I love teasing him about how I earn my living talking while I fish!"

As for Norman's son Kenny, he also caught the fishing bug early on. Not surprising with a dedicated angler for a father, whose "work" consisted of leading fishing tours across Quebec! After impressing onlookers with his accurate marksmanship and natural dexterity with a fishing rod at the ripe old age of eight, Kenny wondered if one day maybe he could follow in his father's footsteps. Now at age 27, Kenny can boast that he has the best job in the world—filming, collaborating, travelling, and fishing with his father and, in his own way, transmitting his passion to anglers of all ages in the province.

THE TEAM COMES FIRST

Like father, like son? Yes and no! Although they're both driven by the same passion, Norman and Kenny know that they each have their own take on it, and it's just as well. In fact, they complement each other. "My dad taught me to have confidence in myself when practicing my sport, and above all to remain true to myself," says Kenny. "I learn a lot from my son," adds Norman. "Kenny knows way more than I do about the technical aspects of the boats, equipment, fishing rods, and reels and so

on. He keeps more up to date and passes on the information to me."

PRINCECRAFT FOR LIFE

Norman remembers his first experience with a Princecraft. He made his fishing tournament debut with the Pro Series 142 he bought in 1986, and he's never looked back. Norman is a loyal Princecraft owner: his relationship with the brand dates back more than 20 years, and is still going strong. "What I love about Princecraft is that it just keeps getting better and better every year. I've never regretted buying any of my Princecraft boats."

... TO SON

Following in his father's footsteps, Kenny is a Princecraft man through and through. He says that the Xpedition 200 SC he uses for the Bonne pêche show is a real "fishing machine." "Everything has been well thought out, and it shows. The wider fore and aft platforms provide plenty of room for both of us. The livewells are within easy reach and the spacious storage compartments allow us to carry our equipment without damaging it."

Personally, Kenny can't see himself doing any other job, and Norman agrees. "Even when we're not filming the show, we still fish. We're completely nuts about it! Every morning, we watch the weather reports and imagine ourselves on our boat, looking for the best spots and fine tuning our techniques, continuing to share our passion for fishing as long as possible."

▶ **Mentor, fun, healthy competition**

/// WHO IS MORE PATIENT? ///

▶ **My father.** When he's chosen his spot, he tends to stay there for a long time. I like to move around.

▶ **Definitely Kenny.** I'll move to another location if the fish aren't biting as much as I like.

/// WHICH OF THE TWO OF YOU IS MORE ADVENTUROUS? ///

▶ **Norman.** He has more experience, so he always tries to go farther and push our limits.

▶ **I am, and at a 100 miles an hour!** Kenny is afraid when I'm at the helm. I go fast, but I don't take unnecessary risks. I just want to know the limits of my boat, and how far I can push it.

/// WHEN THINGS ARE NOT GOING WELL ON THE WATER, WHO LOSES HIS TEMPER FIRST? ///

▶ **I'd say we're about equal on that one.** We have the same personality. That's what people tell us anyway.

▶ **Kenny.** I must admit that I did in the past, but I've gotten older and wiser (laugh). I've changed!

/// WHO HAS CAUGHT THE BIGGEST FISH? ///

▶ **Me.** An eight-foot white sturgeon weighing in at 300 pounds.

▶ **Kenny** caught a nine-and-a-half-foot sturgeon on the Fraser River in British Columbia. I've never fished that species though, so I can still beat him. (laugh)



THE NORTHERN ADVENTURE



OF JOCELYN DÉMÉTRÉ

When a fishing tale starts in Afghanistan and ends in Canada's far north, you know it's going to be a good one. This is the moving story of a soldier and avid fisher who sees wide open spaces as a source of great adventure.



“THIS IS THE LAND WHERE THE SUN NEVER SETS”

Jocelyn Démetré is in the middle of the desert on his second peace mission in Afghanistan when he learns that his request to be transferred to Canadian Forces Northern Area Headquarters in Yellowknife has been accepted. He is ecstatic. His dream of fishing, tranquillity, and the beauties of nature is about to come true. One thing's for sure—he's gonna need a Princecraft. Jocelyn grabs the satellite phone at his Afghan base camp and buys the Princecraft he's always wanted, the Sport 172. A fabulous fishing story is about to begin in the land of the midnight sun.

Following in the footsteps of the first explorers who wandered the Northwest Territories in 1771, Jocelyn arrives in Yellowknife on the shores of Great Slave Lake. Jocelyn has been dreaming of exploring the lake with his wife and three kids for a long time. Great Slave Lake is a big body of water, more than 28,000 km² in area. The locals examine his boat, perplexed. “For this lake you need a boat that's at least 20 ft., you won't go far with a 17 footer,” says a well-meaning Yellowknifer. But Jocelyn is stubborn and when he decides on something, it's rare that he changes his mind. He launches his “too small” Princecraft, and the magic happens.

INTERVIEW

It's been four seasons now that Jocelyn's been proving that strength and durability are more important than size. Because his Princecraft Sport 172 is so light, it's very easy on the gas, which means he can travel farther than the "too big" 20 footers crisscrossing the lake. Plus, his Princecraft's aluminum hull and riveted construction make it perfect for landing on islands and negotiating shoals. Thanks to his boat's agility, Jocelyn has found fishing spots that very few others can reach.

FISHING UNDER THE MIDNIGHT SUN

Summers are short north of the 60th parallel. That's why Jocelyn takes full advantage of the eight weeks of good weather and warm temperatures the region offers to share his passion with as many visitors as possible.



"This is the land where the sun never sets. In the summer, we have more than 20 hours of daylight, which means we can go on long fishing trips. Since night never falls to tell us to stop fishing, we basically fish till we drop. That's the real adventure of the Northwest Territories." And when Jocelyn and his guests become too tired to fish, they land on one of Great Slave Lake's many islands to enjoy the pink and orange sky typical of these northern regions.

Visitors can't get enough of the lake and its gigantic trophy fish. Just ask Daniel Gilbert, who works with TV host and well-known angler Norman Byrns. Or ask Kenny Byrns, Norman's son. Both Daniel and Kenny went fishing on Great Slave Lake with Jocelyn this summer.



"Daniel and Kenny had a great time here. Kenny broke his fishing record of 22 pounds by catching a 32 pound trout." But Jocelyn laughs at the thought that such a great pro wasn't able to beat the record of his 15 year old daughter, Béatrice, who caught a monster weighing almost 35 pounds last year. (Since respect for wildlife is all-important, Béatrice released the fish back into the water once the requisite photo was taken.) But it's Jocelyn who holds the all-time record, with a fish weighing almost 40 pounds caught only a few days before Daniel and Kenny came to visit.

Jocelyn is getting set to retire from the Canadian Armed Forces this year. He's looking forward to showing off his northern home full time. He has every intention of sharing his passion by taking people on safari-style expeditions, combining wilderness camping, troll fishing, and exploring. "My Princecraft and I tackle summer at 100 miles an hour here. We come back tired and sore, but with a satisfied smile on our lips—it's all part of the experience here in Yellowknife."



/ ARRIVAL

5:00 a.m. Dawn over Lake Saint-Louis is perfect. Near the marina in Lachine on Montreal Island, more than 60 anglers survey the horizon. The hot rays of the rising sun reflect off their boats, ready to head out on the water. Thirty-four teams are competing, two people per boat, all with more than a few tricks up their sleeves. Throughout the day they'll try to outcompete each other using ingenuity and technique to win top honors. With everyone back in port, each team's catch of five live bass will be proof of their tremendous effort, and who knows, may even bring tremendous rewards.



/ ANCHORS AWEIGH

6:15 a.m. Liette Laroche, President and Secretary-Treasurer of Pro-Bass Canada is about to give the official start signal. Liette is the woman at the helm of the Pro-Bass tournament. She's known for her frankness and openness, but it's above all the pleasure she takes in being part of such a great gang that comes through from the first time you meet her. After all, with this type of tournament, you come for the people as much as for the fishing! Standing five-foot tall, with an impish smile and twinkling eyes, Liette makes everyone want to come back year after year.

6:30 a.m. The anglers receive their last instructions. Motors ready, hands on throttles, the teams anxiously wait for their number to be called so they can finally head out for nine hours of excitement on Lake Saint-Louis, where strategy and technique is the name of the game.



/ RETURN TO PORT

3:30 p.m. The competitors come down off their clouds and back to earth. Some faces indicate that the fishing has been good, while other show some disappointment, but all agree that the day was tough going. The blazing sun and higher than usual water level caused the larger fish to take refuge at the bottom of the lake. However, when the catches are officially weighed, it seems that some competitors have been luckier or savvier than others.

3:45 p.m. Amid the frenzy and excitement of the return to port, a siren blares marking the end of the competition. The good news is that all the teams have gotten back in time for the weighing, because latecomers suffer a penalty that shaves a half pound per minute of delay off their final catch weight.




/ THE BOOTY

5:00 p.m. The weighing is finished, and we have a clear winner. First prize goes to Ronald Centen and Mike Léger, with a total of 18.42 pounds. The top ten receive prizes ranging from \$150 to \$1,500. For the rest... well, there's always next year. However, almost all the anglers are also registered for the "lunkers" category, which gives top honors to those who catch the biggest fish of the tournament. For the winners—even more prizes! Tired from their long day but satisfied with their experience, the anglers can now relax. After-tournament time is a great opportunity to share and compare techniques and tricks. But after a day in the hot sun, everyone will probably turn in early.

FISHING WITH ALLIGATORS



Garry Welch, fishing pro and CEO of Pro-Bass Canada, has explored more than his share of waterways in his nearly 60 years of boating. In 2013 his thirst for adventure gave him the opportunity to test the mettle of his Princecraft—and have the best fishing experience of his life. One cold morning in February, this inveterate thrill seeker headed off to Clewiston, Florida, to explore Lake Okeechobee.

Of course there was no way he was leaving his boat behind. Although some people opt to rent a boat at their destination, he prefers to take his Hudson DLX SC with him, towing it on his sturdy Princecraft trailer. When he arrived in Florida, Garry was glad he had made that decision. “At Okeechobee your boat had better be in perfect condition because come morning, you’re putting it in the water with some 300 other boats. If you have a problem with your motor, that’s just too bad, you miss your turn,” recounts Garry. With his Hudson DLX SC, he had no trouble passing the technical inspections. Even though the boat had just been towed 3,000 km, its mechanics were reliable and in good condition.

KING OF THE JUNGLE

Boating on Lake Okeechobee is not for everyone. Garry quickly realized how complex the area is. With huge expanses of floating vegetation, countless islands, and winding channels, the lake presents an exotic décor that can be tough to navigate. "It's like a jungle," he tells us. "You venture into the channels without really knowing what's at the other end. Sometimes you meet other boats in very narrow channels and you have to figure out how to get past. Other times the water depth can be tricky. You can quickly find yourself in swampy waters where your boat can get stuck." Garry was able to manoeuver through this jungle with ease, however. "I love Princecraft boats because they're designed for the real life situations that adventurous anglers face. You can go anywhere and you know the boat can handle it."

Adventurous, Garry? I guess you have to be to travel to the southern U.S. without a net to fish lakes swarming with bass. Lake Okeechobee is definitely challenging. The floating vegetation can be very dense and you need to use two-ounce weights to get through it. The fishing is strenuous, but really satisfying. "The fish are usually hunted by alligators. It's amazing how easy it is to catch them, in fact. The bass almost never got away," Garry remembers with a smile.

AN UNFORGETTABLE TRIP

The Internet offers very little information on Lake Okeechobee. Only a few amateur videos are available on YouTube. Garry proudly told us that he planned his trip by reading comments from fellow travelers on his extensive Facebook network. However, he advises less experienced anglers to hire one of the numerous friendly guides in the region when fishing Lake Okeechobee. Clewiston and its surrounding area offer lots of accommodation options: hotels, motels, camp grounds, and mobile homes fully equipped for fishing enthusiasts. Garry was so thrilled with his adventure that he's sure to return in the coming months. In fact, Lake Okeechobee piqued his curiosity and he feels that it still holds many surprises for him.

Garry will turn 61 this year, just like Princecraft. A coincidence? Probably, but there are two things that Garry does firmly believe in—fishing and the boat that has enabled him to experience his greatest adventures, his **Hudson DLX SC**.

DESTINATION: LAKE OKEECHOBEE

Lake Okeechobee in southeastern Florida is a favorite spot for American anglers. Perhaps it's because of its huge size, or maybe the fact that it's teeming with fish. One thing's certain, it's well named. Oki is a Native American word meaning water and chobi simply means big.

Lake Okeechobee boasts 1,900 km² of channels, islets, floating islands, and rushes and grass stretching as far as the eye can see. The lake may be huge, but it's also surprisingly shallow. An average depth of only nine feet separates the bottom of your boat from the lake bed. It's a breathtaking environment and a very special ecosystem. You'll see some amazing wildlife on Lake Okeechobee, where alligators, herons, and bald eagles thrive and hunt for prey.

The shores of this vast reservoir of water and bass have been developed to accommodate hundreds of fishing boats every day. But Lake Okeechobee still offers moments of absolute tranquility as you navigate the thousands of peaceful, winding channels.





THE **XPERIENCE** SERIES

ADAPTS TO YOUR EVERY NEED!

You have to see the profile of this fantastic boat to fully appreciate its ingenuity. By lowering the lateral lines to the aft of the boat, the R&D team has achieved perfection on the water while preserving what pleasure boaters really love, namely Princecraft's European look. The stern is trimmed down to provide a bigger area in the fore section and more storage space at the deck level. Storage for what? Seats, the top, and all your gear of course. Want to switch from water skiing to fishing? Convert your boat into the perfect fishing machine in a snap by retracting the roof and folding down the jump seats into the deck to create a huge platform.
